German A Level

Studying German beyond (I)GCSE level will give you the life-long ability to communicate in a foreign language, enhancing your future travel and work prospects and opening up a whole new culture and society to you. German is the most widely spoken language in Europe and a really useful language to **have on your CV** – Germany has the fourth strongest economy in the world.

The German department is staffed by an experienced team of native and non-native speakers and students benefit from weekly conversation classes with the language assistant. German can be combined with almost any subject at university, with the majority of language courses involving an opportunity to spend a year abroad. Apart from careers in translating, interpreting or teaching, there is an ever-increasing number of openings that combine advanced language skills with professions in finance, the law, business and science.

Assessment

Paper 1

Listening and reading comprehension/Translation into English 50 % weighting

Paper 2

Translation into German/Essays on the film and novel studied. 20 % weighting

Paper 3

Speaking examination - Discussion of a stimulus card and presentation and discussion

of the candidate's individual research project.

30 % weighting
